Union Agency was constructed in 1875 of light gray limestone quartied loss then a hendred parts owny - from the same impressive agency will an which the heilility theelf at the Pills anthonized to serve as a consolidated seat of government for the Five Civilized Tribes, the massive eight-room, two-story structure -- essentially a rectangle with one-story perches on the cast (main entrance) and south -- was designed to serve also as a fort, if necessary.

At one time a telescope is said to have been placed just outside the cupola (since removed) on the flat roof. The lookout must have been well nigh perfect, as Agency Hill (used by Indians for signal fires long before the white man arrived) towers better than a hundred feet over the relatively flat Arkansas River valley. A watchman stop the Agency building itself (first covered with native boards and later shingled) could, with a glass, easily have kept under surveillance much of the Three Forks country within a 25-mile redius.

When the Five Civilized Tribes Museum took over supervision of Union Agency in 1955, a preservation and restoration program was begun. Various minor alterations and embellishments were removed so that the building now is once again much as it was when accepted by the government about January 1, 1876.

First floor of the museum contains special historical displays for each of the five tribes. On the second floor are a library, the art gallery, and a photo room. Well known Indian artists represented at the museum include Willard Stone and the late Jerome Tiger, whose nearly life-size clay sculpture of an Indian stick ball player (unfinished when he died) is featured in a circular setting in the center of the gallery.

Had it not been for a barrel of salt - this according to the late Oklahoma historian Grant Foreman - Union Agency might well have been located some 25 miles southwest of its present location atop Agency Fill on the west edge of Muskogee.

Government affairs for the Five Civilized Tribes in 1874 were scattered between Tahlequah (for the Cherokees), Boggy Depot (for the Choctaws and Chickasaws), Newoka (for the Seminoles), and a site northwest of Agency Hill (for the Creeks). Consolidation in a single location offered obvious advantages and it was so authorized, to become effective July 1, 1874. Shortly thereafter Agency Hill was included in a 640-acre tract transferred by the Creek Nation to the U. S. Government as site for the new agency building.

Before actual construction becam, however, a campaign was mounted by Eufaula interests to locate the agency on the recently constructed Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railroad. A site was proposed (near present-day Checotah) and, according to Foreman, it might well have been selected had not certain resourceful Muskogee partisans secretly dumped a barrel of salt in the well that would have served the new location. A final inspection discovered the unacceptable "salt water" well and retention the Agency Hill location was assured. It was made by G. W. Ingalls, the first agent in charge of the combined office.

The solid two-story building, of native stone quarried near by, was accepted from the contractor, Proctor & Maxwell of Kansas City, about Jan. 1, 1876. Although its location atop a hill over 100 feet above the flat Arkansas River valley gave the structure obvious strategic advantages (it was constructed to serve as a fort, if necessary), it was too far from Muskogee itself (established on the NK&T when it built through the Three Forks country in 1872) to be completely convenient. Several of the agents who succeeded Ingalls therefore maintained offices in town and the building was finally abandoned by the agency in the early 1880s. Used for a time as a Baptist mission, it stood empty from 1889 to 1891.

Ownership reverted to the Creek Nation in 1891 and for a time the huilding beyond on or han school. On New. 1, 1999, the haid Agency building, with 100 acres, was conveyed by the Breeks to the City of Muskogee for park purposes. Honor Heights Park today (azaleas, dogwoods, redbuds, roses, many other plantings) is widely recognized as one of the nation's most beautiful. In 1914, however, the building itself was turned over to the Veterans Administration which maintains a large hospital immediately to the south.

Yet another change in ownership took place in 195%. The Da-Co-Tah Indian Club, with a membership of women the trace their Indian ancestry through official tribal rolls, helped to secure return of the historic building to the City of Bushegee and, in 1955, to effect incorporation of the Five Civilized Tribes Buseum. Certain structural changes and additions made in the early part of the century have since been eliminated and the building restored to its original appearance. On April 16, 1966, the museum first opened its doors. Its purpose: "to perpetuate early Oklahoma history and maintain for posterity the heritage of the Cherokeo, Chickasaw, Choctaw, Creek and Seminole Indians."

Receiving no municipal, state or federal funds for operating expenses, the museum is supported entirely by membership fees and a modest (50 cents and 25 cents) admission fee. The 1969 budget was \$22,500. Total paid attendance in 1969 was 20,357. Over 300 women contributed volunteer service to the museum program. Since its opening the museum has marketed some \$28,500 worth of paintings and sculpture by artists of the five tribes. More than 800 persons now hold membership in the museum.
