DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Completed in 1892. St. Joseph Retreat (see name in stone, Photo No. 1) is a four-level (with basement) structure, roughly 100 x 48 feet in size. The foundation (basement level) is of natural sandstone blocks, 16-18 inches thick. They carry the next two levels - of red brick. The top story is a fine mansard, roofed with decorative metal shingles. Gone today (it is not known when) are the pyramidal towers over the east and south entrances, the profusion of bulbous brick chimneys, and the Victorian porch on the east.

The north section was added in 1905. It is unusual in that its second and third story windows on the west are generally Gothic in style while their counterparts on the east have an Eastern, almost Islamic appearance. Feature of both east and west gable is a pair of oval windows with that intersect at right angles to create a cross. The overlapping section of these windows opens.

Ceilings originally 16 feet in height, have now been lowered throughout the building for heating and cooling purposes. All stairways have the original carved wood banisters. Carved wooden door frames ornament the basement rooms where the Sisters once lived. Wainscoting is found throughout the building.

St. Joseph Retreat looks today much as it did when built, with the changes noted above. Though obviously neglected and somewhat dilapidated in appearance, it remains essentially sound, structurally. The Sisters, with local preservationists, hope that it can be preserved, perhaps even restored, so that it may once again, in some capacity, contributed to the enrichment of life in Oklahoma as it did for more than three quarters of a century.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

If a good social history of Oklahoma is ever written, the Benedictines, both men and women, will command an important chapter. They pioneered Indian Territory, pushed back frontier ignorance with superb education, and brought a sense of decency and justice that helped tame those turbulent times.

So wrote Editor Frosty Troy of The Oklahoma Observer in 1976 during the Nation's Bicentennial. Few Oklahomans would disagree. Male Benedictines pioneered Catholic mission work among the Indians in 1876. They established Sacred Heart, a school that grew eventually into present St. Gregory's College in Shawnee, placed in the National Register*The Benedictine Sisters - three of them - arrived in Guthrie, O. T. in 1889, just five months after Oklahoma Territory was opened to settlement. St. Mary's school was opened immediately. By 1892 the entire order - another 23 sisters - had arrived (from Creston, Iowa) and St. Joseph Reatreat had been constructed. It is this tall, gabled, red brick structure, with a section added onto the north in 1905, for which National Register is also sought with this nomination.

St. Joseph's Academy opened in 1897, a boarding school for girls with classes for both the elementary grades and high school. It was the only such Catholic school in the new Oklahoma Territory. (Sacred Heart was in Indian Territory.) The campus occupied only a corner of the 308-acre farm operated by the Sisters. There were orchards, and a herd of pure-bred Holstein cattle. The Sisters produced all their own poultry and beef, milk and butter, vegetables and fruit.

As the needs of the students grew, the school grew to meet them. In 1917 a regular four-year college curriculum was begun. The name became Oklahoma Catholic College for Women, affiliated with Catholic University, Washington, P. C. The first parochial school in Wishowa had become the new state's only Catholic college - fully scarped and offering St. St. FD degrees.

Classes were taught for women of all ages and grades for 30 years. Then in 1949 the name was changed once again - to Benedictine Heights College. New housing facilities were added. And that fall the school became co-educational. Men, however, were day students only. Within five years the once wholly female school had its

first male president. He began a move to update and expand the facility - a move that led, ironically, to the transfer of the school from Guthrie to bigger, more affluent Tulsa. The actual transfer came in 1965. The Sisters sold the property to the City of Guthrie for \$150,000. The Motherhouse moved to Tulsa and a three-quarter-century era on the frontier had ended.

In Guthrie the Sisters had watched a town of tents and crude shacks grow into a brick-paved Victorian showplace. They had watched the birthing of Oklahoma as the Constitutional Convention met a few blocks away to plan the fusing of the twin territories into the 46th state. They had seen the capital slip away from Guthrie to Oklahoma City, the development and changes brought by World War I and World War II.

Through it all, however, the convent remained essentially a teaching mission. From 1892 to 1962 the Sisters staffed St. Joseph's in Guthrie, from 1894 to 1924 the Langston Parish School. Over the years they opened and/or operated a score and more parish schools over the state. In 1979 St. Joseph Convent will begin a year-long celebration of its Centennial. Although they started in Iowa and now live in Tulsa, the Sisters will focus their attention on Guthrie, their home for most of that time. The Centennial will extend into 1980 to coincide with the world-wide celebration that year of 1500 years of Benedictinism.

Since the late 1960s St. Joseph's facilities have accommodated a federally funded Job Corps program. And this makes St. Joseph Retreat, the oldest significant Catholic structure remaining in Oklahoma, a part of what is believed to be the nation's only city-owned Job Corps Center.
